Prayer of Confession

Holy and loving God, we gather from near and far longing to feel your presence among us. We long to sit at a table with you and share a meal, just as you did with your beloved disciples. In many ways, the Last Supper was so ordinary — it was a gathering of close friends around a table for a meal. And yet, this was no ordinary meal. This was an extraordinary meal where Jesus showed the world what sacrificial love and servanthood truly looks like.

Lord Jesus, we are stunned at the depth of your love for us. You knew that your hour had come. You knew your enemies. You knew your betrayer. You knew that your friends would deny and abandon you. You knew that the crowds would cry out — Crucify Him! And yet you loved until the end.

Compassionate Redeemer, on this night we confess that we are more like the disciples that we care to admit. We are fickle in our faith and we are in denial about our sinfulness. Like Peter, we often argue with you instead of receiving your wisdom and grace. Like Judas, we are often more interested in a few pieces of silver than serving you. As the Church, we have failed to model your example of love as you love us.

Forgive us for taking your suffering too lightly and receiving your grace too cheaply.

Hear our prayers, O God, in a time of silent confession...

In your mercy, Heavenly Father, pass over our sin. Wash us in the living waters of your forgiveness. Cleanse us with your amazing grace.

O Triune God, as we prepare to hear the story of the Last Supper once again, focus our attention on Christ. Transport us away from the cares and worries of this world and pull us towards Christ's covenant of grace, so freely given. In remembrance of all that you have done for us, we give thanks to you, O Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world. Amen.

Assurance of Pardon

On this holiest of nights, receive the Good News: just as Christ washed the feet of his disciples, we too have been cleansed from our sin through the blood of the Lamb. Rejoice and be glad: pardon, healing, and salvation are ours through Jesus Christ, our Messiah and King. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Scripture Reading Dawn Flood

<u>Prayer of Illumination</u>

Let us pray. Gracious God, give us the wisdom of your Spirit to understand and receive the depth and breadth of the love that Christ showers upon us. Bless this reading of your Word that we might be transformed by its grace. Amen.

Our New Testament reading is taken from the Gospel of John and we will be reading chapter 13, verses 1-17 and 31-35.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already decided that Judas son of Simon Iscariot would betray Jesus.

And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from supper, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him.

He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?"

Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand."

Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet."

Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me."

Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!"

Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you."

For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had reclined again, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, slaves are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them."

Continuing with verses 31-35

When he had gone out, Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me, and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

This is the Word of the Lord.

Reflection: Setting an Example

My parents have decided to downsize and move to a senior's living community. This week, their house will go up for sale after living there for almost 50



years. Needless to say, it's been 'all hands-on deck' to get the house ready and my sister, myself, and our families have all been involved in this process. Last weekend, a group of us were at their house and after several hours of packing, we started looking through old family photo albums. My father has always been an avid photographer and there are so many pictures that need to be organized!

One of the most common pictures in these albums is of people gathered around my parents' dining room table. In fact, we could probably fill an entire photo album with just this type of picture. These pictures bring back such



fond memories and there is no doubt that together, they tell a story – of love and fellowship, of loss and change. They mark the passage of time in a profound way.

It is this experience that has been in my head as I pondered the familiar story of the Last Supper. The Gospel of John – which we have been reading through here at Knox since January – tells the story of the Last Supper very differently than the other Gospels, but in essence, they all start with the same picture...a group of friends gathered around a table to share a meal. But not just any meal – it was the Passover meal. Like our gatherings at Christmas and Easter, the Passover meal was – and continues to be - a

special one within the Jewish faith tradition. This meal, which commemorates God's protection over the Israelites in Egypt, took a lot of time and care to prepare. (see Exodus 12)

According to John's Gospel, Jesus and the disciples were sitting at the table waiting to be served the Passover meal. They could smell the lamb roasting over the fire and hear the women whispering as they made sure that everything was ready



to be served. And in the middle of this meal, Jesus did something unexpected and unconventional. He got up from his seat, took off his outer robe, tied a towel around his waste, got the water and basin, and got down on his knees to wash this disciples' feet. Aside from the fact that the disciples SHOULD have already washed their feet when they arrived, this wasn't exactly a convenient time for him to move AWAY from the Passover meal that was prepared for them! Jesus was totally disrupting the picture that was being developed for the evening's festivities by engaging in this shocking behaviour.

Here was the teacher doing the menial work of a servant.

And truth be told, the disciples didn't deserve this special treatment from their teacher and leader. Over and over again, the disciples continued to be confused about who Jesus was and why he was doing what he was doing. They were unsure if Jesus really was the Messiah and secretly, many of them hoped that he would become the new King who would restore Israel to its former glory and overthrow the Roman Empire. In this picture, we see three disciples...Peter – poor Peter – who rebuked Jesus for touching his feet only to be rebuked himself. And then we see Judas. Judas who stole money from

their coffers. Judas who had already made a deal with the devil. And don't forget that we see John, the writer of this Gospel, who was also present, taking it all in. Did John truly understand what was unfolding before his eyes? Not really because he said so himself throughout his Gospel narrative – we didn't understand everything until after the resurrection. This was the cast of characters who Jesus dined with that evening.

They were doubtful, confused, and hypocritical - and yet, Jesus loved them all.

With this act of service, Jesus offered his disciples cleansing from their sin. He forgave their <u>past</u> sins of doubt and disbelief. And he also forgave their <u>future</u> sins because they would all abandon him soon.

With this act of sacrificial love, Jesus set an example for them – to wash each other's feet. To love one another. Jesus served them with a compassion and humility that is beyond our understanding.

How can anyone love another person that much, especially someone who has hurt you? Betrayed you?

Jesus can. Jesus does. Jesus will.

In the midst of sharing bread and wine with his closest friends, Jesus offered the perfect example of what worshipping and serving God looks like. Little children, he said, I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another. (John 13:33-35) As he was preparing to go to the cross, he gave them a job to do – after I am gone, you <u>must</u> love one another. You <u>have</u> to wash the feet of others – even those who doubt and disbelieve. Even those who betray and abandon

the faith. This is the only way that people are going to know who I am really am – Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God, the Messiah, the Saviour of the world.

In our world that is full of brokenness, heartache, and violence, sharing this message of love is indeed a daunting task for the Church. Within the global Church, millions of Christians are persecuted for their faith in Christ. Other believers – in Myanmar, Syria, and Palestine – are celebrating Holy Week in the midst of ruined cities and churches.¹ And in our secular society, the Church is being pushed to the margins so much so that many people do **not** want our service or our love.

So, how do we do this, Lord? How can we be more like Christ when we are more like the disciples than we care to admit? How do we find the strength to carry on? Christ provides us with the perfect example of how to do this. By loving others as Christ loves us. By humbly serving others in the name of Jesus Christ. And the strength to love is renewed tonight in the sharing of these elements of bread and wine. The strength to serve is renewed tonight by knowing that Christ's table – which by the way, is not like at my parents' dining room which fits 10 people if you push it – is large enough for each one of us. Indeed, Christ welcomes all people to this table and our job is to set an example by inviting others to taste and see that God is good.

Amen.

As we prepare to gather at the table that God has prepared for us, we will now sing our hymn of approach - Twas on that night (#537, verses 1-4)

The Institution of the Lord's Supper

Beloved in the Lord, attend to the words of the institution of the Holy Supper of our Lord Jesus Christ, as they are delivered to us by the apostle Paul:

I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you,
that the Lord Jesus, on the night when he was betrayed
took a loaf of bread,
and when he had given thanks,
he broke it and said,
"This is my body that is for you.
Do this in remembrance of me."
In the same way he took the cup after supper, saying,
"This cup is the new covenant in my blood.
Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."
For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup,
you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

When Jesus shared the bread and wine in this way, he gave new meaning to everyday things. He transformed them into himself so that we can share in his death and resurrection. Whether you are sitting in this sanctuary or are watching online at home, the everyday elements before us have been set apart from all common use and transformed into a holy mystery. But this is not because of anything that we have done – it is only through the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit.

Friends, if you are hungry for forgiveness, if you are thirsty for a love that is without end, if you are seeking a table where you feel included – know that you are welcome here.

In the name of Jesus Christ, come and experience the gifts of God for the people of God!
