Prayer of Lament (including The Lord's Prayer)

This week's lament is based on Psalm 22, which Jesus cried out from the cross according to the Gospels of Matthew and Mark.¹ He cried – My God, my God, why have you forsaken me! This Psalm is hauntingly beautiful because it gives voice to the darkness that we have all experienced. But I want you to remember that after Psalm 22 comes the hopeful words of Psalm 23, which is our responsive Psalm today. Together these two Psalms are deeply moving for people of faith.

Let us pray from wherever we are.

In a world of fake news and false prophets, we don't know who to trust. Should we put our trust in politicians who are wooing us for our votes? Should we trust lawyers and business leaders who want our money? Should we trust celebrities and social media influencers who want our likes?

Who is telling the truth?

O God, do not forsaken us! We cry out to you by day, but you do not answer. By night, you are silent. Don't you hear us? Can't you hear the words of our groaning?

In a time of silence, hear our cries of confession...

Readings

Prayer of Illumination:

Let us pray. Almighty God, in you are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. Open our eyes that we may see the wonders of your Word; and give us grace that we may clearly understand and freely choose the way of your wisdom. We pray this in the name of Christ our Lord. Amen.

Our Old Testament reading is taken from the Book of Psalms and we will be reading Responsively Psalm 23.

Leader: The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. People: He makes me lie down in green pastures.

Leader: He leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul. People: He leads me in right paths for his name's sake.

Leader: Even though I walk through the darkest valley. **People: I fear no evil.**

Leader: For you are with me. **People: Your rod and your staff—they comfort me.**

Leader: You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. People: You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.

Leader: Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life. People: And I will dwell in the house of the LORD my whole life long. Amen.

Dawn

Richard and I will be reading the whole 9th chapter of the Gospel of John. The words are not on the screen. Let us listen to God's most holy Word.

As he walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?"

Richard:

Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming, when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent).

Dawn:

Then he went and washed and came back able to see. The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" Some were saying, "It is he." Others were saying, "No, but it is someone like him." He kept saying, "I am he." But they kept asking him, "Then how were your eyes opened?" He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' Then I went and washed and received my sight." They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know."

Richard:

They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a Sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. Then the Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight.

Dawn:

He said to them, "He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed, and now I see."

Richard:

Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not observe the Sabbath." Others said, "How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?" And they were divided. So they said again to the blind man, "What do you say about him? It was your eyes he opened."

Dawn:

He said, "He is a prophet."

Richard:

The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight and asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?"

Dawn:

His parents answered, "We know that this is our son and that he was born blind, but we do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself." His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews, for the Jews had already agreed that anyone who confessed Jesus to be the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. Therefore, his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."

Richard:

So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him, "Give glory to God! We know that this man is a sinner."

Dawn:

He answered, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see."

Richard:

They said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?"

Dawn:

He answered them, "I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?"

Richard:

Then they reviled him, saying, "You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from."

Dawn:

The man answered, "Here is an astonishing thing! You do not know where he comes from, yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but he does listen to one who worships him and obeys his will. Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing."

Richard:

They answered him, "You were born entirely in sins, and are you trying to teach us?" And they drove him out.

Jesus heard that they had driven him out, and when he found him he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?"

Dawn:

He answered, "And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him."

Richard:

Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he."

Dawn:

He said, "Lord, I believe." And he worshiped him.

Richard:

Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see may see and those who do see may become blind."

Dawn:

Some of the Pharisees who were with him heard this and said to him, "Surely we are not blind, are we?"

Richard:

Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would not have sin. But now that you say, 'We see,' your sin remains.

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Reflection: Spiritual Blindness

Time is running out. Despite great opposition, Jesus is trying to reach as many people as possible to show the world that he is the Messiah, the Son of God. As they were walking along, his disciples point out a blind man who is begging on the side of the road and they ask him – who sinned? This



blind man or his parents? Jesus answers them – no one has sinned. This blind man is here at this moment so that I can heal him and God's glory will be displayed. And so, Jesus makes some mud and puts on the man's eyes and gives him some instructions. The man obeyed and was healed.

As we saw last week in John chapter 8, Jesus continues to go against the teachings of the Law of Moses and heals – yet again – on the Sabbath. His pronouncement that no one has sinned also goes against the rabbinical teachings of the day because they believed that physical ailments were caused by sin. Some rabbis even believed that an unborn child could sin in their mother's womb, causing sickness or disabilities.

Now to our modern ears, this belief is horrifying. Modern medicine and science are so advanced now that we know that this is NOT true! But even though we know that blindness is NOT caused by sin, we have to acknowledge that our understanding of what is 'truth' is very subjective. What I believe to be true is not necessarily what you believe to be true. I may believe that the earth is round and you may believe that it is flat. I may believe that vaccines save lives and you may believe that they cause far worse diseases than COVID or the measles. I may believe that Jesus Christ is the Messiah and you may simply call him a prophet. Ultimately, the story that Richard and Dawn just read for us is about truth. Who is telling the truth here? It is Jesus? Or the disciples? The man who was healed? His parents? The Pharisees? What about all the people in the background? Were *they* telling the truth? This cast of characters were all speaking from different perspectives and so, their understandings of the truth about Jesus' miraculous healing were all different.

Think about it...

The disciples were trying to discover what truth Jesus believed about sin.

The healed man's neighbours debated the truth about who he was.


This man's parents were telling a truth that would keep them safe.

The Pharisees were looking for a truth that would punish Jesus.

They are all telling different truths.

As I was reflecting on this passage and what does truth really mean, there were a LOT of examples from the news that I could have shared with you. But I found myself thinking about a great movie from the early 1990s called "A Few Good Men" with an excellent ensemble cast including Tom Cruise, Kevin Bacon, Demi Moore, and the legendary Jack Nicholson. The plot follows the court-martial of two U.S. Marines charged with the murder of a fellow Marine and the tribulations of their lawyers as they prepare their case. If you like court room dramas, this is a great film! And like our story from John chapter 9, there are many characters telling their own version of the truth. The climax of


the movie takes place in the courtroom when Tom Cruise's character, a military defense lawyer, confronts Jack Nicholson's character, a Colonel in the Marine Corps, and Nicholson's character yells the now classic line – **you can't handle the truth!**

What this classic line reminded me of is that when people speak the truth about who Jesus is, there are many different reactions to this truth. In our story, it is the blind man who received healing from the Lord who says – you can't handle the truth. Listen again to what he said when the Pharisees questioned him – Whether or not, [Jesus] is a sinner, I do not know. One thing I do know; I was blind but now I see! (John 9:25) You can persecute Jesus as much as you want, but I know what happened to me. I know what I believe.

The truth that he spoke that day is that Jesus Christ, the Messiah, offers sight to the blind. And just as we saw last week in our story about the woman caught in adultery, Jesus isn't afraid to replace the laws of judgment and condemnation with the laws of



love and forgiveness. Jesus does not care that he is healing on the Sabbath – he is not committing a sin because he is the divine Son of God.

This man's truth is the REAL truth. The ABSOLUTE truth.

But the religious leaders rejected this truth. Even his parents were reluctant to accept it for fear of being banished from the synagogue, the centre of Jewish life. The characters in this story all had their own versions of the truth and for various reasons, they could not see the truth which was right before their eyes. **They were spiritual blind.** Not only were they blind to the truth, they were also unwilling to change their

perspective, their version of the truth. Believing in Christ was not something that they were prepared to do.

But for the man who was healed, this was their loss. Because he believed, his life was transformed and by the end of the story, he worshipped Christ with joy.

At its core, this is a hopeful story. For us today, we are reminded to open our eyes to the truth that is Jesus Christ. In these Lenten days, it is good to read through the Gospel of John where we read story after story about how amazing Jesus really is. He turned water into wine, he told a religious leader in the middle of the night that God so loved the world, he offered living water to the Samaritan woman at the well, and he saved a woman from being stoned. And so much more! And the love and forgiveness that he gave to these people is also available to you and to me. We too can be healed when we believe in Jesus Christ.

But this story also contains a warning. For those who do believe, we need to be on guard against fake news and false truths. We need to be aware that there are false prophets out there who do not speak the truth in love. We need to protect ourselves from spiritual blindness through prayer and reading God's Word; through worship, service, and fellowship with other believers. All of these things prepare us to defend our faith and say, I can handle the truth that Jesus is the Messiah. Can you?

To God be the glory. Now and always. Amen.
