Prayer of Illumination:

Let us pray. O Lord, your Word is a lamp to our feet and a light to our path. Give us grace to receive your truth in faith and love, and strength to follow on the path you set before us. In the name of our blessed Redeemer we pray. Amen.

Our Old Testament reading is taken from the Book of Psalms and we will be reading Responsively Psalm 27, verses 1-9, 14.

Leader: The Lord is my light and my salvation;

People: whom shall I fear?

Leader: The Lord is the stronghold of my life;

People: of whom shall I be afraid?

Leader: When evildoers assail me to devour my flesh—

my adversaries and foes—they shall stumble and fall.

People: Though an army encamp against me, my heart shall not fear;

though war rise up against me, yet I will be confident.

Leader: One thing I asked of the Lord, that will I seek after:

People: to live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life,

to behold the beauty of the Lord, and to inquire in his temple.

Leader: For you Lord, will hide me in his shelter in the day of trouble;

he will conceal me under the cover of his tent; he will set me high on a rock.

People: Now my head is lifted up above my enemies all around me,

and I will offer in his tent sacrifices with shouts of joy;

I will sing and make melody to the Lord.

Leader: Hear, O Lord, when I cry aloud, be gracious to me and answer me!

People: "Come," my heart says, "seek his face!"

Your face, Lord, do I seek. Do not hide your face from me.

Leader: Do not turn your servant away in anger, you who have been my help.

People: Do not cast me off, do not forsake me, O God of my salvation!

All: Wait for the Lord; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the Lord! Amen.

Our 1st New Testament reading is taken from the Gospel of John and we will be reading chapter 1, verses 1-5.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being.

What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

Our 2nd New Testament reading is taken from the Gospel of John and we will be reading chapter 8, verses 12-20.

Again Jesus spoke to them, saying, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life."

Then the Pharisees said to him, "You are testifying on your own behalf; your testimony is not valid."

Jesus answered, "Even if I testify on my own behalf, my testimony is valid because I know where I have come from and where I am going, but you do not know where I come from or where I am going. You judge by human standards; I judge no one. Yet even if I do judge, my judgment is valid, for it is not I alone who judge but I and the Father who sent me. In your law it is written that the testimony of two witnesses is valid. I testify on my own behalf, and the Father who sent me testifies on my behalf."

Then they said to him, "Where is your Father?"

Jesus answered, "You know neither me nor my Father. If you knew me, you would know my Father also."

He spoke these words while he was teaching in the treasury of the temple, but no one arrested him, because his hour had not yet come.

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Reflection: When God says I AM – The Light of the World

Did you know that there is a light bulb called the "Centennial Light Bulb"?





It is in the Guinness Book of Records for being the world's longest burning light bulb and it even has its own web site.¹ You can even watch it live on the "Bulb Cam."² The Centennial Light was first turned on in 1901 and currently lives in the main Fire Station in Livermore, California. It has had a few homes since 1901 and has been off for short periods of time because of a power failure or faulty wiring. The longest that it has been turned off for was a week because of renovations at the Fire Hall.

Now, most of us probably have extra light bulbs in our homes, but they burn out after a few years if we are lucky. So, how is this possible for a light bulb to burn for over 100 years? According to their web site, this light bulb was made with superior materials and excellent craftsmanship. Also, because it hasn't been turned on and off all the time like a normal light bulb, its internal parts haven't worn out from daily use.

And there is another reason – a more sinister reason...did you know that there was a secret society of light bulb manufacturers in the 1920s called the Phoebus Cartel?³ The Presidents of the world's largest light bulb manufacturers met in secret in Geneva in

December 1924 and agreed that they should make their products WORSE in order to increase sales and make more money. So, they signed an agreement to reverse engineer their light bulbs so that they would only work for a maximum of 1,000 hours. **They conspired to break their own products.** They even had penalties if one company's light bulbs were better than everyone else's!! The Cartel collapsed during the Second World War when these companies found themselves on opposite sides of the conflict, but they accomplished what they set out to do.

Hard to believe, but it's true.

And we now know that this isn't the only time when this kind of conspiracy has taken place in the service of the 'god' of capitalism. The technical term for this is 'planned obsolescence.' As consumers, we have all been frustrated by planned obsolescence - when something breaks and it is more expensive to replace it than repair it. If they can send human beings into space, why has my family replaced our dishwasher twice in the 11 years that we have lived in Burlington?

But we are more than just consumers. We are people of faith.

And as people of faith, we believe that there is a light that shines brighter than the Centennial Bulb. We believe that this light will outlast any man-made light bulb.

And that is the Light of the World, Jesus Christ.

The imagery of light and darkness is contained throughout the Old and New Testaments and there were lots of options for me to select that go with our main reading from



John chapter 8. I could have selected Genesis 1 where it says – In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep...then God said, 'Let there be light'; and there was light.

(Genesis 1:1-3) What about Psalm 119, the longest book in the Bible, where we read – your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path. (Psalm 119:105) Or the prophet Isaiah - the people walking in darkness have seen a great light. (Isaiah 9:2) And what about the New Testament? In the Apostle Paul's letter to the Colossians we hear these words – [Christ] has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins. (Colossians 1:13-14) And at the end of the Book of Revelation, the new Jerusalem is described as a city with no need for sun or moon for the Glory of God is its eternal light. (Revelation 21:23)

From Genesis to Revelation, we are invited to be people of the light. And in the Gospel of John, that invitation is present from the very beginning where Jesus is compared to the light. A light so strong, so powerful, so brilliant that it will overcome the darkness of this world, including the darkness of bad decisions and poor choices. The darkness of brokenness. The darkness of evil. Jesus then goes on to use this imagery to describe himself – I am the Light of the World. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life. (John 8:12) This is the testimony that he was giving to the Pharisees, this was the evidence that he was giving to those who doubted that he was the divine Son of God. As we saw last week when we talked about Christ's first "I AM" statement - I am the Bread of Life - Jesus again wasn't offering them something that would break or burn out. His light is not going to be damaged by malfunctioning components. It's not going to eventually wear out because of corrupt business practices. Instead, Jesus reveals himself as an eternal light that provides direction, wisdom, warmth, and hope. Think of a time when you have walked in darkness and then seen the light. Remember the feeling of relief that you felt? I am not alone! I am safe! I was blind but now I see! This is what it's like to bask in the glow of Christ's light. And even better still, this light is freely available to the whole world.

And friends, we need this light so desperately in our world today. So much is broken. So much is evil. And no one can deny that the darkness can be so overwhelming that fear and anxiety and despair are always close at hand. I have experienced this in my own faith journey and I know that I am not the only one. As a faith leader, I have been asked many times — especially since the pandemic and even as recently as last week — Rev. Emma, why is there so much darkness? Why do so many people suffer? Where is Christ? Has his light faded away or burned out altogether?

While there are no easy answers to these questions – the greatest thinkers of all the world's religions have wrestled with the question of suffering since time began - what I will say is this...the prince of darkness, the evil one, Satan, the devil, or whatever you want to call him, is alive and well in this world. As King David said in Psalm 27, there are enemies all around us. But, as people of faith, we believe that there is a light that is far more powerful that the prince of darkness. We believe that this light comes from our Triune God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit – and that THIS LIGHT will never fade or burn out. Following that light – trusting that it is present even when you can't see it – is the only way to overcome the darkness. We need to stay focused on Jesus Christ, the Messiah, the Word made flesh, the Bread of Life, the Light of the World. We need to focus on God's Word which is a lamp unto our feet and light for our path. Jesus Christ can – and will - rescue us from the power of darkness and transfer us into his glorious kingdom. As the great hero of our faith, the late Archbishop Desmund Tutu once wrote,

Goodness is stronger than evil;

Love is stronger than hate;

Light is stronger than darkness;

Life is stronger than death;

Victory is ours through Him who loves us.⁴

People of God – there is no need to be afraid of the dark when we focus on Jesus Christ, the Light of the World. Amen.
