Scripture Readings Rick Craig

Prayer of Illumination:

Let us pray. O God, you know us better than we know ourselves. As the Bible is read today, help us to listen for your voice. Lead us on the right path and keep us safe in your Word. We pray in the name of Jesus Christ, the Great Shepherd of our souls. Amen.

Our Old Testament reading is taken from the Book of Psalms and we will be reading Responsively Psalm 23.

Leader: The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. **People: He makes me lie down in green pastures.**

Leader: He leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul.

People: He leads me in right paths for his name's sake.

Leader: Even though I walk through the darkest valley.

People: I fear no evil.

Leader: For you are with me.

People: Your rod and your staff—they comfort me.

Leader: You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies.

People: You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.

Leader: Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life.

People: And I will dwell in the house of the LORD my whole life long.

Amen.

Our New Testament reading is taken from the Gospel of John and we will be reading chapter 10, verses 1-18.

"Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers."

Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again, Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits, but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly.

I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away, and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own, and my own know me, just as the Father knows me, and I know the Father.

And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So, there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason, the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Reflection: When God says I AM – The Good Shepherd and Gate

[In front of the Communion Table]

The LORD is my shepherd, I shall not want.

He makes me lie down in green pastures;
he leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul.
He leads me in right paths for his name's sake.

Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod and your staff—they comfort me.

You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.

Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD my whole life long.

Many of us have been reciting the 23rd Psalm since childhood. We learnt it in Sunday School and some of you even had to memorize Bible passages in public school. Regardless of which version you know, this Psalm has given comfort and strength to generations of Christians *and* Jews. For me personally, this is one of the Bible passages that I recite when taking off in an airplane because I don't like flying. And on a professional level, this is the most popular passage that I have preached on for a funeral service. We have all had moments when this timeless Psalm has strengthened our faith and given us hope.

And when you add this Psalm to the fact that Jesus used the same imagery to reveal himself as the Good Shepherd, then we have an incredible example of how the Old and New Testaments are interconnected. The Messiah, Jesus Christ, is revealed to us in the teachings of the Hebrew Scriptures.

These two passages together are truly a beautiful thing.

[Walk up to the Pulpit]

Do you know how hard it is to preach on these familiar passages? Do you know how challenging it is to say something NEW about passages that many of you have known since childhood? The Rev. Dr. Will Willimon, a retired Bishop in the Methodist tradition, who is a gifted writer, scholar, and one of the greatest preachers of our time, described these passages as "limp from overuse."¹

And to be honest, I agree with him.

So, what I want to do today – with Professor Willimon as my guide and inspiration – is to take some time to bask in the glow of these two passages and the promises contained within them. I'm not going to talk about their historical or cultural significance in the time of King David or Jesus. I'm not going to connect the dots between the Old and New Testaments. I'm not going explain all of the nuances. Preachers and theologians who are much smarter than I am have already done this faithful work.

Today you do not have to DO anything. At the end of this reflection, there will be no list of things for you to do this week. There will be no altar call to deputize you as 'assistant shepherds' who help the Good Shepherd bring about the kingdom of God. And that's because Psalm 23 and John 10 – known together as the "Shepherd passages" – are not about us!! In our society that is hyper focused on the individual, the Shepherd passages invite us to reflect on the actions of God as our Creator, Redeemer, and Guide.

And so, in the midst of the craziness of our world, opening your Bible and basking in the timeless power and beauty of God's most holy Word is often the only thing that makes sense. But not to get our marching orders or a job description about what it looks like to be a good minister or a good disciple...but to be reminded of who GOD is. Who does God reveal God-self to be? And so, that's what I did on Friday on your behalf. I printed out our Bible readings for today and spent time with them, circling the words that jumped out at me and phrases that spoke to me.

Before I share with you what I found, it's important for you to remember that I am NOT the Shepherd. Don't rely on me to build your relationship with the Lord. What I am about to show you does NOT require a Master's degree. Anyone can do this with a piece of paper and pen. I share these thoughts with you as a fellow sheep who has not always followed the right path and who has gotten stuck from time to time.

For those who are watching online, I am going to disappear from your screen for a few minutes, but you will be able to hear me. I promise that I'll be back shortly!!

Here is what the Holy Spirit revealed to me about these passages...

SLIDE CHANGE

In the 23rd Psalm, I was reminded that the Shepherd offers his sheep – meaning you and me - provision and nourishment. He leads us towards safety and rest – glorious rest! He restores our weary souls. Even when we are anxious, even when we are surrounded by enemies, even when we are dying, the Shepherd promises us peace and comfort for he is always near. He anoints us in goodness and mercy.

We are invited to stay with the Shepherd – but not in a barn or a sheep pen or exposed to the elements on the top of a windy hill² – but to live with God in his house all the days of our lives. And when we pass from this life to the next, we will dwell with the Lord forevermore.

SLIDE CHANGE

In John chapter 10, I read that the Good Shepherd, Jesus Christ, continues to offer us protection — this time from thieves and bandits. His voice is the One that we sheep need to listen to when strangers offer us things that do more harm than good. When the wolves of this world try to attack us, the gatekeeper warns us of the coming danger. And under his protection and guidance, there is salvation. There is abundant life.

And if that wasn't enough, the Good Shepherd laid down his life for the sheep. Of his own accord, Jesus sacrificed his life for us.

Jesus Christ sacrificed himself because of his great love his flock.

Friends, no matter who you are or what you have done or what is going on in your life right now, the promises contained in the Shepherd passages are Good News indeed. God reveals himself as "I AM" the Good Shepherd and we are his beloved sheep. And no where in these passages are we asked to be 'assistant shepherds.' In fact, we are powerless because we cannot do what God did for the world through his only begotten Son, Jesus Christ. There is no human being in history who has had the power to save the world as Christ did. As sheep, we are completely dependent on the Good Shepherd for salvation and abundant life. And if anyone who tells you that they can offer you salvation by another path - beware, for they are a thief and a bandit. They are wolves in sheep's clothing.

These promises of salvation and eternal life are why there is such deep comfort for people of faith in these passages. When we are anxious, when we are surrounded by enemies, even in the valley of the shadow of death, the Good Shepherd loves us and tells us – don't be afraid, for I am always near.

And these promises of God's love and goodness and mercy will NEVER get limp from overuse. Indeed, they are why we can say with confidence – my cup overflows. Amen.

Be with those who struggle in their workplaces or in their families. We pray for those who are weary from the stresses and strains of daily life. Surround them with your abiding presence and remind them that they too can dwell in the house of the Lord.

We pray for those who we name before you today...

Be with all these people, O Lord. Grant them your healing. Give them your comfort. Remind them that they are beloved children of God and that you are always with them.

Blessed Saviour – we come to you with the blessed assurance that you hear our prayers. In gratitude for all you have done for us, the only prayer that matters is a simple one – thank you for being our Shepherd. Amen.
