Scripture Readings Jean Lowe

Prayer of Illumination:

Let us pray. Eternal God, through the life, death and resurrection of your Son your kingdom has broken into our troubled world. Through your Spirit, help us to hear your Word. Give us grace to respond in faithful obedience so that our lives might be signposts of your kingdom. In Christ's holy name we pray. Amen.

Our Old Testament reading is taken from the Book of Psalms and we will be reading responsively Psalm 56.

Leader: Be gracious to me, O God, for people trample on me; all day long foes oppress me;

People: my enemies trample on me all day long, for many fight against me.

Leader: O Most High, when I am afraid, I put my trust in you.

People: In God, whose word I praise, in God I trust; I am not afraid; what can flesh do to me?

Leader: All day long they seek to injure my cause; all their thoughts are against me for evil.

People: They stir up strife, they lurk, they watch my steps.

Leader: As they hoped to have my life, so repay them for their crime; in wrath cast down the peoples, O God!

People: You have kept count of my tossings; put my tears in your bottle.

Are they not in your record?

Leader: Then my enemies will retreat in the day when I call.

People: This I know, that God is for me.

Leader: In God, whose word I praise,

People: in the Lord, whose word I praise, in God I trust; I am not afraid.

What can a mere mortal do to me?

Leader: My vows to you I must perform, O God; I will render thank offerings to you.

People: For you have delivered my soul from death, and my feet from falling, so that I may walk before God in the light of life. Amen.

Rev. Emma:

Our Gospel reading is taken from the Gospel of John and Jean and I will be reading select verses from chapter 11. Hear the Word of the Lord.

Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill."

Jean:

But when Jesus heard it, he said, "This illness does not lead to death; rather, it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was.

Rev. Emma:

Then after this he said to the disciples, "Let us go to Judea again."

The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?"

Jean:

Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble because they see the light of this world. But those who walk at night stumble because the light is not in them." After saying this, he told them, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him."

Rev. Emma:

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother.

Jean:

When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again."

Rev. Emma:

Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day."

Jean:

Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

Rev. Emma:

She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

Jean:

Now Jesus had not yet come to the village but was still at the place where Martha had met him. The Jews who were with her in the house consoling her saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb to weep there. When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

Rev. Emma:

When Jesus saw her weeping and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see."

Jean:

Jesus wept.

Rev. Emma:

So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"

Jean:

Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone."

Rev. Emma:

Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days."

Jean:

Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed you would see the glory of God?"

Rev. Emma:

So they took away the stone.

Jean:

And Jesus looked upward and said, "Father, I thank you for having heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!"

Rev. Emma:

The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth and his face wrapped in a cloth.

Jean:

Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go."

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Reflection: When God says I AM – The Resurrection and the Life

Imagine for a moment that you are driving up Guelph Line to attend a friend's graveside committal service at Burlington Memorial Gardens. Your friend passed away unexpectedly after a brief illness and unfortunately, you weren't able to see them before they died. The traffic is busy, especially on the Highway 403 overpass because there is currently road work being done. You slowly make your way up the escarpment to the cemetery where you join your friend's family and other friends at the graveside. Being at a cemetery is a very emotional experience because you cannot deny the finality of it all. You will never see your friend again. And you are not the only one who is struggling. The emotions of the gathered crowd are raw and palpable. You feel the sadness. You see the tears. You hear the weeping.

Now that everyone has arrived, the Funeral Director gathers everyone close to the grave so that you can hear what is being said. The Minister, who you've never met before, begins to speak...

Dearly beloved, we are gathered here today to lay your friend to rest. Hear these words of comfort and hope from our Lord, Jesus Christ:

"I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." (John 11:25-26)

The Minister goes on talking, says a prayer, and reads another passage from the Bible. At the end, they mark a cross on the coffin with some sand and say – earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust. Amen. Everyone gets a flower to lay on the coffin and the Funeral Director announces that the service is over and everyone is welcome to attend the reception back at the funeral home. The cemetery staff will come when everyone is gone and lower the coffin into the ground.

And that's it. It's a 5-minute service. The Minister gets paid, shakes a few hands, and then leaves to do whatever Ministers do with the rest of their time.

You speak briefly to the people who you know and then make your way back down Guelph Line to the funeral home for the promise of a hot cup of coffee and an egg salad sandwich.

Sound familiar?

I think that many of us have had this kind of experience at one cemetery or another. Indeed, many of you have family and friends who are buried at Burlington Memorial Gardens. In this church family, I have officiated at many services at that cemetery — Liz Bordian, Lorraine Clark, Madge Cooper, Eunice and Len Erwin, Louise and Jim Griffiths, Patty Kirby, Doris Lamb, Anna Lovell, Gery Puley, Kitty and Don Smith, Joyce and Ralph Weston. Knox's previous minister, the Rev. Mark Hoogsteen, is buried there...shall I go on? I cannot drive past that cemetery without thinking about the great cloud of witnesses who are no longer with us. And my heart hurts.

Loss and grief are part of the human condition. If you love someone, you will grieve their loss. And many of us live with grief each and every day, especially those in our midst who have lost children.

While we – as human beings – are all familiar with grief, we are <u>not</u> familiar with our friends being resurrected after they pass away. None of us have been to a graveside service where the dead person wakes up and comes out of the tomb as Lazarus did.

And so, the passage from John 11 that Jean and I just read for you is perhaps the most challenging "I AM" statement that Jesus made according to the Gospel of John. Christ's words, on their own – I am the resurrection and the life – are relatively easy to understand. With this statement, Jesus is revealing himself to be our hope for the future. When we believe in Jesus Christ as our Lord and Saviour, then death is not the end for us.

When we pass from this life to the next, we will dwell with the Good Shepherd forevermore. This beautiful promise is not only hopeful – it gives us comfort when we grieve. It gives us the strength to live each day in the knowledge of God's love and his desire for us to have an abundant life.¹

But what do we do with the details surrounding this "I AM" statement? That Jesus intentionally delayed his arrival? That he left his dear friends, Mary and Martha, alone to deal with the devasting loss of their brother? That he prayed out loud to his Heavenly Father so that there would be witnesses who would share this miracle far and wide? That with 3 words – Lazarus, come out – Jesus raised him from the dead?

Well, I could do a whole sermon series on this passage alone because there is lots to discuss...the dynamic between Jesus and the disciples, the Jewish customs for funerals, the relationship between Jesus, Lazarus, Mary, and Martha, and the fact that Jesus is predicting his own death and resurrection with this miracle.

Without diving into all of this rich soul food, there are 2 things that I want to highlight and they both have to with the intersection between Christ's humanity and divinity. In this story, we see that as a man, Jesus felt grief as we do. In verse 35, John records this simple yet profound fact – Jesus wept. Jesus understood what it feels like to stand at the grave of a friend and be overcome with sadness and grief. Jesus was a human being just like you and me. But unlike us, he was more than a mere mortal. He was also fully divine. And in his divinity, he offers us a hope that is out of this world. Through of his own death and resurrection, Christ defeated the bonds of sin and death and has promised us life *beyond* death. He has promised us a future of reunification with our loved ones where – as John wrote in the Book of Revelation - he will wipe every tear from

[our] eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away. (Revelation 21:4)

This joyful hope is what we celebrate in the sharing of Christ's body and blood – that in Jesus Christ, who is the Resurrection and the Life, we can participate in the reality of the resurrection.

Prayer

Triune God, divine Advocate, you guide and encourage us. When things seems hopeless, you breathe new life into our weary bones. When faith seems like a waste of time and energy, you renew the Church in hope and confidence. O Holy Spirit, breathe new life into all believers. Nourish our souls with the body and blood of Christ. Equip the global Church to worship, serve, pray, and love in the name of Jesus Christ.

Blessed are you, Holy Spirit.

O God, who always listens to us, who breathes new life into us, call us forward to be people who live into the hope of the resurrection. May we be reborn in you. Through Christ, with Christ, and in Christ, all honour and glory are yours, our creator, redeemer, and friend. Amen.

Institution of the Sacrament

Beloved in the Lord, attend to the words of the institution of the Holy Supper of our Lord Jesus Christ, as they are delivered to us by the apostle Paul:

I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus, on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

It used to be that we had no hope. But no more. Our hope is in Christ Jesus, the Resurrection and the Life. He willingly and obediently sacrificed his life so that we will not perish but have everlasting life. As we celebrate this wonderful hope, we pray for the Holy Spirit to come and blow over these elements. Whether these elements are present in this sanctuary or at home, we recognize that the Holy Spirit is not confined to any building, but blows wherever it choses. O Spirit of the Living God - take these natural elements of bread and wine and transform them into this holy mystery.

In the name of Jesus Christ, I invite you to come - all who hunger and thirst for God's grace and mercy – come and experience the Bread of Life and the Cup of Salvation!

Prayer
