Prayer of Illumination

Let us pray. We come to you today so weary and worn from the cares of life. In this time of worship, come to us, O Holy Spirit, through God's most holy Word. Give us glad hearts as we listen to what you want to say to us today. We pray this in the name of Jesus, who is the way, the truth, and the life. Amen.

Our Old Testament reading is taken from the Book of Psalms and we will be reading Responsively Psalm 67.

Leader: May God be gracious to us and bless us **People: and make his face to shine upon us,**

Leader: that your way may be known upon earth, **People: your saving power among all nations.**

Leader: Let the peoples praise you, O God; People: let all the peoples praise you.

Leader: Let the nations be glad and sing for joy, **People: for you judge the peoples with equity and guide the nations upon earth.**

Leader: Let the peoples praise you, O God; People: let all the peoples praise you.

Leader: The earth has yielded its increase; God, our God, has blessed us. People: May God continue to bless us; let all the ends of the earth revere him. Amen.

Rev. Emma:

Our New Testament reading is a combined reading. As today is Pentecost, I will be reading that story from the Book of Acts chapter 2, verses 1-21 and Neil will be reading John 14:1-6, which is connected to the sermon series that I have been doing on the Gospel of John. Let us listen to God's most holy Word.

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them.

Neil:

[And Jesus said...] Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me.

Rev. Emma:

All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each.

Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language?

Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs —in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power."

Neil:

In my Father's house there are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going."

Rev. Emma:

All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

Neil:

Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?"

Rev. Emma:

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh,
and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.
Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy.
And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist.
The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day.
then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

Neil:


Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Reflection: When God says I AM – The Way, the Truth, and the Life

We often forget that the Bible was written over the span of thousands of years. Even without the controversy about how long it took for the world to be created, the stories contained in Old Testament cover over 3,000 years of human history.¹ There is also a gap of over 400 years between the last writings of the Old Testament and the birth of Christ. For example, scholars believe that Psalm 67 – our Responsive Psalm for today – was written during the time when Israel was held captive in Babylon, which took place over 500 years before Jesus was born.² A long, long time...

That said, there are times when events in the Bible move at a much quicker pace. Take our two New Testament passages as an example – John 14 and Acts 2. Because many of us are visual learners, I created this timeline to connect these two stories...

60 days. Give or take a few days. That's all.

With today as Pentecost, if you go back 60 days, that was Monday April 7th. Think about ALL of the things that the disciples experienced in 60 days!!

The disciples, with the exception of Judas Iscariot, were present at both events. In John chapter 14, they heard Jesus predict his own death and then tell them with great love and compassion – do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God. Believe also in me. I'm going away, but I promise that I will come back and take you with me because I **am the way, the truth, and the life.** Follow me and you won't get lost. And 60 days later - after Jesus had died, rose from the dead, and ascended into heaven – the disciples were together praying when the rush of the Holy Spirit came upon them like wind and fire.

In this moment, the disciples were transformed. Not only could they speak languages that they had never learnt, they received their mission – go and spread the Good News of the Gospel. **Finally, the disciples understood everything.** On that first Pentecost, the pieces of the puzzle started to make sense. All that Jesus said and did converged into a hopeful vision of the future. Jesus Christ IS the Messiah, the Lamb of God, the Bread of Life, the Light of the World, the Good Shepherd, and the Resurrection and the Life. He is all of these things and so much more. And the Holy Spirit came – as Jesus said it would – to guide, encourage, and strengthen the disciples to take Christ's message of love, forgiveness, salvation, and eternal life out into the world. But not as drunken or fearful men – instead, the Spirit transformed them into bold and courageous evangelists who would proclaim that everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved. This was the **way** forward for the disciples. This was their **truth**. This became

The transforming power of the Holy Spirit guided the disciples to spend the rest of their lives pursuing this mission of bringing people to Christ and growing the Church. Indeed, all of them – with the exception of John – would be martyred because of their work. John, whose Gospel we have been reading through since January, was the only disciple to die of natural causes.

Fast forward another 2,000 years and we find ourselves in sitting here in this beautiful sanctuary or watching this service online. We are in a nation that didn't exist in the disciples' time and they would have considered everything about our society as foreign and alien.

And so, I found myself wondering what if the disciples could be with us today? What if John, Peter, and Thomas had a time machine and travelled to 2025 - what would they think of the Church if they spent 60 days with us?

I think that they would experience two overwhelming emotions.

The first emotion would be **joy**. Jesus Christ is still worshipped! The Church is still here! All of the disciples' efforts, all of their sacrifices were worth it because the Good News of the Gospel spread far and wide and Christ's message of love and hope continues to resonate with people of all nations and races. They would have also been so thankful that many believers worship the Lord without fear of persecution. Maybe John would

even recite part of Psalm 67 - Let all the peoples praise you. Let the nations be glad and sing for joy! (Psalm 67:3-4)

The second emotion that they would perhaps feel is more complicated – **disappointment**. In the midst of the world's brokenness, fear, and hopelessness would John, Peter, and Thomas see people praising the Lord to the full extent of the Gospel message? Would they see Christians sharing their resources with the poor and marginalized or just maintaining their expensive buildings? Are there bold and courageous evangelists in 2025 who proclaim that everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved? Do Christians follow the leading of the Holy Spirit and live into the hope that Jesus Christ is <u>still</u> the way, the truth, and the life? Sadly, the answer to these questions is *sometimes...we do* struggle to following the teachings of Jesus. We *do* ignore the movement of the Holy Spirit and secretly hope that God's Spirit will blow over other people, not us. And yes, indeed, sharing the Good News of the Gospel and growing the Church are not always our top priorities.

I also think that the disciples would be disappointed by the divisions in the Church. I'm sure that they would be baffled by the number of denominations that exist in our community. And that even within denominations, there are divisions over theology and practice.

Joy and disappointment...

I have to tell you the truth – today's message was REALLY hard for me to write! Last week's 180th Anniversary service was fantastic. Not only did all of the planning come together behind the scenes, the service itself was meaningful and encouraging. I certainly felt inspired and I know that many of you felt the same way. 180 years is a huge milestone and one to be celebrated. It was joyful!

But the truth is that the future is rather uncertain. And that's because our world is very different from the world where John, Peter, and Thomas existed. It's far more complex and our faith has - in many ways - been pushed to the margins. Even though we have beautiful big buildings and are not being persecuted for our faith, the Church is struggling.

As I have been wrestling with both joy and disappointment this week, I was worried about being pessimistic after such an encouraging service last week. But this is the reality of the world in which I find myself and I have never been one to sugar coat the truth. As a woman of faith who tries to listen to the Holy Spirit's movement in my own life and the life of this congregation, it is my responsibility to be honest with you. So here is my realistic take on things...

Life is hard right now.

The world is broken.

Being a Christian in 2025 is hard.

Being a Minister in 2025 is hard.

And the Church's future is complex and uncertain.

And yet...this is <u>not</u> our Church. This is <u>not</u> my pulpit. It is Christ's Church.

Jesus Christ is still our Lord and Head of the Church. The Holy Spirit is still at work – in us and through us, giving us abilities we never thought possible. And when we get things wrong, God's Spirit moves <u>around</u> us, fulfilling God's divine plan for our lives, the Church, and the world.

This is our <u>REAL</u> hope for the future. That God has a plan for us as individuals and as a community of faith and even though that plan is not clear to us, the Holy Spirit will guide, encourage, and strengthen us to take Christ's message of love, forgiveness, salvation, and eternal life out into the world. When we follow Christ, we won't get lost because the Holy Spirit will transform us into people who would proclaim that Jesus Christ is indeed the way, the truth, and the life.

Beloved in the Lord – be encouraged by the teachings of the Bible because in it, we are told over and over again that there is no need to be afraid of the future because our Triune God – Father, Son, and Spirit – is going ahead of us, preparing the way in faith and in hope. Amen.
