#### Prayer of Illumination

Let us pray. Heavenly Father, it is so tempting for us to ignore the teachings of Scripture. Deliver us from this temptation as we hear your Word proclaimed. By your Spirit, sow seeds of hope and truth into our hearts today. We pray this in the blessed name of lesus. Amen.

Our Old Testament reading is taken from the Book of Psalms and we will be reading Responsively Psalm 46.

Leader: God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.

People: Therefore, we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea; though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble with its tumult.

Leader: There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy habitation of the Most High.

People: God is in the midst of the city; it shall not be moved; God will help it when the morning dawns.

Leader: The nations are in an uproar, the kingdoms totter; God's voice resounds, the earth melts.

People: The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge.

Leader: Come, behold the works of the Lord;

see what desolations God has brought on the earth.

People: The Lord makes wars cease to the end of the earth; breaks the bow, and shatters the spear; burns the shields with fire.

Leader: "Be still, and know that I am God!

I am exalted among the nations, I am exalted in the earth."

People: The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge. Amen.

# Our Old Testament reading is taken from the Book of Deuteronomy and we will be reading chapter 30, verses 3-5.

...then the Lord your God will return you from your captivity and have compassion on you, gathering you again from all the peoples among whom the Lord your God has scattered you. Even if you are exiled to the ends of the world, from there the Lord your God will gather you, and from there he will take you back. The Lord your God will bring you into the land that your ancestors possessed, and you will possess it; he will make you more prosperous and numerous than your ancestors.

## Our New Testament reading is taken from the Gospel of Matthew and we will be reading chapter 13, verses 1-9.

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on a path, and the birds came and ate them up.

Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched, and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. If you have ears, hear!"

This is the Word of the Lord.

#### Reflection: The Scattering of God's People

The Old and New Testament passages that we just heard were selected by the Rev. Mike Aldred, minister at Brant Hills Presbyterian Church with my addition of Psalm 46. Mike is preaching at our joint church picnic this morning and so we decided that we would both preach on the same texts. Even the sermon title is his choice. All three passages have common themes – our connection to the land and our deep desire to be connected with the Lord.

Our short reading from chapter 30 of the book of Deuteronomy is part of a larger story about the Israelites' final years of wandering in the wilderness. They were in the territory of Moab where the Jordon River flows into the Dead Sea. They could actually SEE the promised land from the mountains in this region - so they were very close to the promised land. (refer to picture) They had been scattered in the wilderness all of these long years and now it was time for God to gather his people and bring them back to the land of their ancestors. During this final season of their wanderings, Moses transferred leadership to Joshua, gave a final blessing to the people, and then passed away. (Deuteronomy 31-34)

In Psalm 46, we have a celebration of the security and blessings that we have when we reside with God, who is our refuge and strength. Even as the world changes all around

us, God will not be moved. Even though the nations are in an uproar and kingdoms fall, God will not be moved. Almighty God is with us. For your trivia buffs out there, Psalm 46 is an important part of the history of Protestantism because it was Martin Luther's inspiration for his hymn – A Mighty Fortress is our God.

And then we have our Gospel reading from Matthew chapter 13 where we hear the Parable of the Sower. This is a very familiar passage for many of us where we hear of God's Word being scattered on different types of soil.



Throughout the millennia, there have been many instances where the people of God have been scattered. God's people have been scattered because of war and conflict – over land and natural resources. God's people have also been scattered because of sin and temptation. There are times when we have created our own wildernesses – whether that is because we crave power over others, our love of money, our worship of idols, our struggles with addictive behaviours, or a whole host of other temptations – by our own choosing, we have wandered far from the Lord. Humanity's tendency to give into sin and temptation is seen in the story of the Israelites. It is also seen in the Parable of the Sower. Jesus tells us in this parable that we fail to live in the fertile soil of our faith. Instead, we live among the rocky places and thorns. Our faith is shallow and therefore, is exposed to the harsh conditions.

There is no doubt that it is easy for us to scatter.

But our Scripture passages remind us that our God is a God who gathers. The Lord WANTS to be with us. The deepest desire of God's heart is to be among his people – giving them prosperity, blessings, and nourishment so that we live in rich and abundant

soil. When we gather close to God, when we dwell with the Lord, we can also be still. We can find rest for our weary souls. Jesus reminds us of this promise of rest earlier in Matthew's Gospel when he says - "Come to me, all you who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. (Matthew 11:28-29) This is especially true when the storms come, when it feels like the earth is shifting beneath our feet, because Scripture assures us that God is our refuge and strength, ever present in times of trouble.

God's desire to be with us is also expressed in the Parable of the Sower. In this parable, we are told that God sows his most holy Word on ALL of the soil, not just the good soil. The Almighty God is a **generous** God because for him, all soil is holy ground. No matter what sins and temptations we are dealing with, no matter what wilderness we are wandering around in, God will sow his seeds of love, forgiveness, and hope everywhere. God will find us and gather us into his open arms. And because of this wonderful promise, WE are then able to bear fruit in the name of Jesus Christ.

Friends, many of us will be scattering for the summer months. Whether we are going on vacation to another part of the world or up north to a cottage for a few weeks, we Canadians like to take full advantage of the warm weather to spend time with family and friends, to explore new places, and to enjoy God's beautiful creation. I myself will be off for 12 weeks starting August 1<sup>st</sup> with 2 weeks of vacation and then 10 weeks of sabbatical, which is intentionally designed for clergy to be a season REST and RENEWAL. As you make plans to scatter this summer, always remember that God is sowing seeds of grace and love all around you. Be renewed in God's amazing grace. Be nourished by the Word of God. Be still and know that God is God. But also remember that the seeds that God is sowing around you are not just for your consumption, they are to be shared. No

matter where you go this summer — even if you aren't leaving Burlington at all — remember that you may be the only Bible that people read. As people of faith, your words and your actions matter. Be kind and welcoming in a world where strangers are feared and excluded. Be compassionate and empathetic in a world where so many are quick to judge and condemn. Be loving and forgiving in a world where hatred seems to have the upper hand. In all you say and do, be a witness of the generosity of God so that all people may be gathered up into God's loving arms with this invitation — come to me, all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest.
